Albert Keal was born to the late Clarence Keal Sr. and Luella Stewart Keal. He is preceded in death by his parents and his brothers, Cornelius Joseph Jones, Clarence Keal Jr., and William Keal.

Albert received his formal education from Mary Hines Elementary School. He graduated from Park Avenue High School in 1969. As a student, he was involved in the Honor Society and served on the Student Council. He participated in statewide math decathlons of which he won first place. Albert set several educational goals for himself which he achieved. He also set educational standards for his children because this was important to him. He always said, "Once you learn something it's yours, you have earned it and no one can take that knowledge away from you".

His higher education was achieved at Southern University and A&M College in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. He earned his Bachelor of Science Degree in Accounting. He furthered his educational pursuits by obtaining his Master of Business Administration from Western New England College (Western New England University) in Springfield, Massachusetts.

Albert was baptized under the leadership of Reverend A.D. Tino, III in the St. Moses Baptist church. As a member, he was actively involved in the youth choir, Sunday School, and other youth activities.

On June 5, 1971 Albert married his college sweetheart, and they shared 47 years. They were blessed with the birth of a daughter and a son, Shonne Michelle Keal Soliz Maldonado and Timothy Charles Keal.

In 1973, Albert was recruited by Bendix Corporation to begin his professional career in South Bend, Indiana. In 1977 he was recruited by Digital Corporation in Springfield, Massachusetts. His professional career spans several states and companies including: United Technologies in Dearborn, Michigan, Diesel Recon in Memphis, Tennessee, and Harley Davidson in Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

Albert had a strong desire to give back to his community. He was involved in various civic organizations throughout his life beginning with Junior Achievement in South Bend, Indiana. He was a board member of the YMCA in Massachusetts and a member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Incorporated. Albert was a Harley Davison

HBCU representative specifically to Southern University for aspiring engineering students. He was also an HBCU board member to Clark Atlanta University.

Albert's favorite thing to do was sleep. He also enjoyed working out at the gym as total health was important to him.

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“ Hands down, Albert was my most memorable boss ever. I was so young and naïve when I started working for him. I didn't realize at the time that he was trying to teach me some things. I honestly felt he was picking on me. But over the years I've come to realize there was wisdom in his words and that they affected me for the rest of my career.

Some of those words were:

- Power is taken, not given. He complained incessantly on how I gave my power away. From which seat I chose in a meeting (always sit at the head of the table, or close to it) or how I let other people lead efforts that he felt I should have led. I didn't care about position or power. I wanted to do my work to the best of my abilities and let my work speak for itself. I've learned differently now. You can still do great work, but you have to position yourself as well.
- You can be dead right, but you're still dead. He and I went back and forth on so many issues. If I didn't like an initiative or direction taken, I'd feel it necessary to let him know. It didn't matter if I was right, I had to do as I was told. That inevitably led to the next words of wisdom.
- You've told me all the ways this can't be done, now tell me how it will be done. I use this with my kids even now. He wanted me to stop coming up with how this can't be done and focus on how it could be done. He wanted to make it work, come hell or high water. He used to say "we're heading South, maybe Southwest but it's South"
- You're too black and white. You have to learn to dabble in shades of gray. I like things lined up and in order and life rarely is that way. I wanted a step by step plan and a reason for everything. He wanted me to learn to deal with ambiguity.
