I first met Mr. Hall in 1969 when he opened his barbershop and lived up stairs over his shop on Teutonia Avenue. The building has been torn down. Another barber, James Dylite worked with him. It was a fun place to get your hair cut listening to all of the talk about how Milwaukee used to be and where black people lived, shopped and the politics of Milwaukee at that time. He talked about first coming to Milwaukee when he was a young kid. He stayed with a relative that had no kids. He said his mom thought he was being spoiled and made him come back home. He said in the late 1940's he returned to Milwaukee after World War 2, serving in Germany. He said he did not like school and to learn, a trade, not college, that did not take a lot of time so when down to MIT (Milwaukee Institute of Technically) then now called MATC. He said he enrolled in barber school. He said barber school was more than just cutting hair. He said he had learned anatomy and about diseases. He said once you got your license an investigator from the state would come around every year to check out your shop. He said they no longer do that. He said that all students had to learn to cut black and white people's hair. He was always nice to customers even when they insulted him. He said he furnished barber school in 1947. He will be missed.
